## RESOLUTION to Sunset the Custom of "Cal Poly Time" effective Fall Term 2026

### Impact on Existing Policy: Will change the scheduling of class times.

1 2 3	WHEREAS,	Scheduling classes and meetings to begin at 10 minutes or 40 minutes after the hour, is idiomatically known as meeting on "Cal Poly Time"; and
4 5	WHEREAS,	The use of "Cal Poly Time" for scheduling is a long-standing customary practice on our campus; and
6 7 8	WHEREAS,	The history or rationale for the use of "Cal Poly Time" remains elusive; and
9 10 11	WHEREAS,	Any rationale for "Cal Poly Time" that may have existed at one time, no longer appears to have relevance to current campus operations and scheduling; and
13 14 15	WHEREAS,	A survey of Cal Poly faculty (n=381) during the Winter of 2023 found that nearly half of the faculty were in favor of sunsetting "Cal Poly Time", and 25% had no preference either way; and
17 18 19	WHEREAS,	Consultation with University Scheduling and other Offices on campus showed a preference for sunsetting "Cal Poly Time;" and
20 21 22	WHEREAS,	Consultation with the Instructional Department Heads and Chairs (IDHC) showed that a majority are in favor of sunsetting "Cal Poly Time;" and
23 24 25 26 27	WHEREAS,	Consultation with Cal Poly Transportation and Parking Services, and the Parking & Transportation Advisory Committee indicated that given this advance notice and adequate time to prepare, sunsetting "Cal Poly Time" would not result in operational challenges; and
28 29 30	WHEREAS,	Cal Poly Transporation and Parking Services has communicated to the City of San Luis Obispo Mass Transportation Committee (MTC), and the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) about this proposal to sunset

31 32 33		"Cal Poly" time, thus providing timely allowing MTC and RTAC to build this change into their long-term planning, which is currently underway; and
34 35 36 37	WHEREAS,	Outreach to Academic Affairs, Student Affairs and the Office of the Registrar indicated that given adequate time to prepare, sunsetting "Cal Poly Time" would not result in operational challenges; and
38 39 40 41 42	WHEREAS,	the ASI representative on the Instruction Committee provided feedback from members of the ASI Board that there was no objection to sunsetting Cal Poly time and suggested that starting on the hour better aligns with expectations of employers; and
43 44 45 46	WHEREAS,	The custom of "Cal Poly Time" creates a mismatch in scheduling meetings among the various communities on the Cal Poly campus and with off-campus entities; and
47 48 49	WHEREAS,	The transition from quarters to semesters provides an opportunity to adjust class scheduling times; and
50 51 52 53 54	WHEREAS,	University Scheduling is still developing class scheduling patterns that will optimize the use of instructional facilities and enhance the ability to schedule more classes throughout the day with a greater variety of scheduling patterns; and
55 56 57 58 59 60	WHEREAS,	The proposed change to sunset "Cal Poly Time" for scheduling patterns that start on the hour or on the half-hour will not preclude University Scheduling from creating additional scheduling patterns that may have various starting and ending times to meet the goal of optimizing the use of instructional space; and
61 62 63	WHEREAS,	There are definite advantages to putting the entire campus on the same clock for scheduling; and
64 65 66 67	WHEREAS,	The Cal Poly Campus Administrative Policy defines the Credit Hour in CAP 210.5 . Section 210.5.3 specifies that a credit hour is assumed to be a 50 minute (not 60-minute) period of "seat time" during instruction; and
68 69 70 71 72 73	WHEREAS,	CAP 210.5 aligns with CSU Memorandum AA 2011-14: "CSU Definition of Credit Hour" and AS-922-21, AS 896-20 and AS-838-17 reference the "CSU Definition of Credit Hour" as part of the credit hour policy assessment and assurance and to clarify credit hour equivalents for a modalities of course delivery; and

74 75 76	RESOLVED:	That the Academic Senate of California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo support sunsetting the custom of "Cal Poly Time" for class scheduling thereby putting the campus on the same clock; therefore be it
77		thereby putting the cumpus on the same clock, therefore be it
78	RESOLVED:	That classes scheduled to begin on the hour or half hour will preserve at least
79		a minimum of a 10-minute passing period between classes where possible;
80		therefore be it
81		
82	RESOLVED:	That additional scheduling patterns with starting times that vary from the
83		hour or half hour time pattern will preserve a minimum 10 minute passing
84		period between classes where possible; therefore be it
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86	RESOLVED:	That this provision become effective beginning with the Fall term of 2026.
